Thank you to all who voted to narrow down the themes from all over the country that were suggested for the 2021 CSLP Summer Reading Program. It will be one theme for all ages for 2021. Salina Yoon (http://salinayoon.com) has been selected as our artist for 2021. Her works include *Duck, Duck, Porcupine!*, *Be a Friend, Found, Opposnakes, Kaleidoscope*, and the *Penguin* series. NJ can only submit 3 suggestions from this list that will be voted on by all the State Representatives at the Annual Meeting in April. I have compiled the responses I received as of Feb. 22. **The top vote goes to theme #4: Change the World/Social Justice/Unity/Kindness/Inclusion/Change/Diversity/Equity/Make a Difference/Embrace Different Culture. The next 2 votes are a tie – for theme #2: Art/Visual Arts/Theater/Creativity/Imagination/DIY/Maker and theme #6: Food/Cooking and Culture.** The next highest votes were for theme #1: Animals (zoo/farm/pets/nature/exotic/habitats/wildlife/safari) and theme #3: Ecology/Environment/Nature/Outdoors/Jungle/Environmental Awareness and Conservation. All theme suggestions got at least two votes. I'll let you know what the ultimate winner is in April!
