Please Note: You will not receive summer reading materials for the 2018 program without submitting statistics for 2017's summer reading program. The deadline to submit your statistics is October 13, 2017. This is a FIRM deadline because the final report from the statewide program is due at the end of October.

Although the manuals will only be available via online access for all public libraries this year, all public libraries will receive a printed incentives catalog from Upstart/Demco through the statewide delivery service (or through their library system's local courier) sometime at the end of October. JerseyClicks Changes: Beginning July 1, 2017, JerseyClicks no longer uses Auto-Graphics for database authentication. EBSCO databases on JerseyClicks use geolocation authentication. We also provide library barcode and username/password authentication URLs for EBSCO databases. Currently ReferenceUSA is using a combination of referring URL and library barcode authentication, though by the end of the month they will be using geolocation as well. All of the databases and URLs to add to library websites can still be found at www.jerseyclicks.org.

Fade to Books Grant Project: Nine public libraries were selected to participate in the barbershop literacy project known as Fade to Books, an initiative that places books in the barbershops as a way of encouraging reading among its young customers. These are the selected public libraries: Willingboro, Paterson, Atlantic City, Keyport, Old Bridge, Newark, Roselle, East Orange and Montclair. This is an exciting time as four libraries launched their projects August 1, 2017 and the remaining five libraries launched theirs on September 1, 2017.

Libraries Selected to Host Math and Science Story Time (MASST) Program Series:

The NJ State Library and the National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) at Rutgers University collaborated to offer ten public libraries the opportunity to apply for funding to participate in the Math and Science Story Times (MASST) Series: Bringing math and science to life through reading and art for preschoolers in a community-based setting. This is a STEM initiative that serves the Spanish-speaking community. A few libraries offered the series in the summer, with others planning them for the fall.
